1. Getting started

Location

Important

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Place your phone base within reach of the AC power outlet and telephone wall socket. The socket-outlet should be installed near the equipment and should be easily accessible.

Make sure that it is at least one meter away from other electrical appliances to avoid interference. Your phone works by sending radio signals between the handset and base. The strength of the signal depends on where you place the base. Placing it as high as possible ensures the best signal.

Handset range

The unit has a range of up to 300 meters outdoors when there is a clear line of sight between the base and handset. Any obstruction between the base and handset will reduce the range significantly. With the base indoors and the handset either indoors or outdoors, the range will normally be up to 50 meters. Thick concrete and stone walls can severely affect the range.

Signal strength

III on your handset indicates that you are within range of the base. When out of range of the base, III is off. If you are on a call, you will hear a warning beep.


The line will hang up if the handset moves out of range of the base. Move it closer to the base. The handset will automatically reconnect to the base.

Setting up

Important


The base station must be plugged into the AC power at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord into the wall socket until the handset is fully charged. Use only the power adaptor and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

Connecting the base




- 1. Plug one end of the telephone line cord into the socket marked 4 on the rear of the base, and the other into the telephone wall socket.
- Connect the USB-C cable to the supplied power adaptor. Then plug one end of the cable into the socket on the rear of the base and the other end into a wall socket. Switch on the power supply.

Installing and charging the handset



- Remove the battery cover from the back of the handset and insert the 2 x AAA NiMH rechargeable batteries supplied. Please note the + and markings on the battery compartment and insert in the correct direction.
- 2. Slide the battery cover back into place.
- 3. If you are charging the batteries for the first time, place the handset on the charger to charge for at least 16 hours continuously.
- 4. When the handset is fully charged, **[]** will appear steadily on the display.

Connecting the handset and charger



- Remove the battery cover from the back of the handset and insert the 2 x AAA Ni-MH rechargeable batteries supplied. Please note the + and - markings inside the battery compartment and insert in the correct direction.
- 2. Slide the battery cover back into place.
- 3. Connect the USB-C cable attached to the charger to the supplied power adaptor, and plug it into a wall socket.
- If you are charging the batteries for the first time, place the handset on the charger to charge for at least 16 hours continuously.
- 5. When the handset is fully charged, will appear steadily on the display. The display will show **Handset** and the handset number (e.g. 2) to indicate that it is registered to the base.

Note

If you have purchased a multiple pack, you will need to carry out this process for all the handsets and chargers.

Important

Warning! Use only the approved rechargeable Ni-MH battery cells (2 x AAA Ni-MH 750mAh rechargeable batteries) supplied with your DOT41.

Battery low warning

If I flashes on the display and you hear a warning beep every minute during a call, you will need to recharge the handset before you can use it again.

When charging, will scroll on the display.

Battery performance

In ideal conditions, fully charged batteries should give up to 18 hours talk time or up to 240 hours standby time on a single charge.

Note that new batteries do not reach their full capacity until they have been put to normal use for several days.

To keep your batteries in the best condition, leave the handset off the charger for a few hours at a time.

Running the batteries completely down at least once a week will help them last as long as possible.

The charge capacity of rechargeable batteries will reduce over time as they wear out, giving the handset less talk / standby time. Eventually they will need to be replaced.

After charging your handset for the first time, subsequent charging time is about 6-8 hours a day. Batteries and the handset may become warm during charging. This is normal.

'All talk and standby times are approximate and depend on features selected and usage patterns.

Welcome mode (country dependent)

When you turn on the phone for the first time, it will start in Welcome mode. You will be prompted to select your country, along with the date and time.

Select your country (country dependent)

- 1. Scroll ^ or ∨ to select your country and press the left ⊕ to confirm.
- 2. Press the left to proceed with setting the time and date.


Date and time

- 1. Use the keypad to enter the time **HH/MM** (e.g. 06:30).
- Press ∨, then scroll ⟨ or ⟩ to select AM/PM.
- 3. Press ∨, then use the keypad to enter the date **DD-MM-YYYY** (e.g. 12--08-2025 for 12th of August 2025) and press the left ⊖ to save.

Your DOT41 is now ready for use.

2. Getting to know your phone

Press to open the menu in idle mode.

Press to select menu options and to confirm a displayed option. Press to switch to another call during a call.

D Calls list / Up

In standby mode, press to open the calls list.

During a call, press to increase the earpiece/speaker volume.

When the phone is ringing, press to increase the handset ringer volume. Press to scroll up to the previous menu level.

In predial mode, press to move the cursor to the last line.

E Contact list

Press to open the phonebook entries.

F OK kev

In standby mode, select the new message reminder icon to access incoming call lists or answering machine messages.

Press to select menu options and to confirm or save a displayed option.

G Left key

In standby mode, press to decrease the ringer volume. If two reminder icons are displayed, press to scroll between events.

Press to scroll through the menu options.

H Talk / Hands-free

Make or answer a call.

Press to switch hands-free on or off during a call.

I * / Intercom / Switch from pulse to tone

In standby mode, press to dial a *.

Press and hold to make internal calls and transfer calls to other DOT41 handsets registered to the base

During a call, press to switch from pulse dialling to tone dialling.

J Microphone

K Call block

Press to open the call block menu.

L Right soft key

In editing mode, press to delete a character or digit. Press and hold to delete all characters and digits.

During a call, press to turn the mute on or off.

M Flash key

Use flash (F) functions.

N Right key

In standby mode, press to increase the ringer volume. If two reminder icons are displayed, press to scroll between events.

In standby mode, press to open the redial list.







A In standby mode, press to ring the handset(s).

Press and hold to enter registration mode when registering handsets.

Navigating the menus

Your DOT41 has an easy-to-use menu system.

Each menu has a list of options, which you can see on the menu map on the following page.

When the handset is switched on and in standby mode:

- 1. Press the left to open the main menu.
- 2. Then use ↑ or ∨ buttons to scroll through the available options.
- 3. Press the left \bigcirc to select an option. To return to the previous menu level, press the right \bigcirc . To exit the menu and return to standby mode, press \bigcirc .

Note

If no buttons are pressed for 60 seconds, the handset returns to standby mode automatically.

3. Using the phone

Note

The handset will automatically time the duration of all external calls. The call timer will be displayed on the screen after the call starts dialling out. When the call ends, the total duration of the talk time stays on the display for 3 seconds.

3.1 Switch the handset on / off

Press and hold (5).

3.2 Calls

3 2 1 Make a call

- Press (5).
- 2. When you hear the dial tone, dial the number.

3.2.2 Preparatory dialling

- Dial the number first. If you make a mistake, press the right

 to delete the last digit.
- 2. Press (s) to dial.

3.2.3 Speed dial call

If you have stored the speed dial numbers, press and hold on the keypad in standby to make a call. The saved phone number will dial automatically. To set up a speed dial number, see page 25.

3.2.4 Call from the Contacts or Calls list

You can make a call from the Contacts (see page 23) or Calls list (see page 31).

3.2.5 End a call

Press 🕝.

3.2.6 Receive a call

When you receive a call, the phone rings and and you will see on the display from if it is an internal or external call.

Press (6) to answer the call.

Note

- If Auto answer is switched on, you can simply lift the handset to answer a call.
- If Auto end call (see page 34) is switched off, you will need to press to end a call.

3.3 Adjust the earpiece volume

During a call, press ^ or v to increase or decrease the volume. There are 5 levels to choose from.

3.4 Mute

You can mute your handset so that you can talk to someone nearby without your caller hearing.

- During a call, press the right

 . The display shows Call muted and your caller cannot hear you.
- Press the right again to unmute your call.

3.5 Intercom

3.5.1 Make an internal call

If you have more than one handset registered to the base, you can make internal calls between two handsets.

- Press (A) in standby.
- 2. Scroll \checkmark to select the handset to be called and press (3).

3.5.2 Receive an internal call

When you receive an internal call, the handset number that is calling you is displayed.

Press (to answer the call.

Note

If during an internal call you receive an incoming call, you will hear an alert tone on the handset. Press the left \bigcirc then \bigcirc to hang up the internal call and answer the incoming call.

3.5.3 Switch between two calls

If you need to make an internal call during an external call, you can put the external call on hold and switch between the two calls.

- Press the left ⊕, scroll v to select Ans. Call Waiting, press the left ⊕ to switch to the internal call.
- 2. Press the left \bigcirc again to switch back to the external call.

3.5.4 Transfer a call

You can transfer an external call to another handset registered to the base.

During an external call:

- Press the left ⊕, scroll ∨ to select Transfer call, press the left ⊕.
- If only 2 handsets are registered to the base, the other handset rings automatically.
- 3. If more than 2 handsets are registered to the base, scroll ∨ to the handset that is to be called and press the left —.
- 4. When the other handset answers, press the left \bigcirc to complete the transfer.

Note

The external call resumes automatically after 30 seconds if there is no answer.

3.5.5 3-way conference call

You can hold a 3-way conference call between 2 internal callers and 1 external caller.

During a call with an external caller:

- Press the left

 , select Multi call, press the left
 .
- 2. You can either:
 - enter the number you want to call and press the right \bigcirc ; or
 - press the left

 and scroll

 to select the handset that is to join the call and press the left
 .
 - press () on handset 2 to join the ongoing conference call with handset 1 directly, if the auto join calls feature is switched on for both handsets (see page 34).
- 3. All three callers are now connected to the conference call.
- 4. Press (a) to end the call.

3.6 Hands-free

To talk to the caller without holding the handset and for other people in the room to listen to the conversation over the loudspeaker, simply use the hands-free function.

3.6.1 Make a hands-free call

- Dial the number and then press (5). The call can be heard over the handset loudspeaker.
- 2. Press (3) again to switch the call to loudspeaker.
- 3. Press 🕝 to end the call.

Note: During a hands-free call, press \bigcirc or \bigcirc to adjust the volume.

3.6.2 Answer a call hands-free

When the phone rings, press (6) twice to answer the call hands-free.

3.6.3 Switch to hands-free during a call

- 1. During a call, press (5) to put the call on the loudspeaker.
- 2. To switch hands-free off and return the call to the earpiece, press 🕥 again.

3.7 Redial

You can enter the calls list to redial a number, see page 31.

3.8 Paging / Find handset

You can alert a handset user that he/she is wanted or locate a missing handset. Paging calls cannot be answered by a handset.

- Press FIND on the base. All handsets registered to the base will ring.
- 2. To stop the ringing, press **FIND** on the base again or press the right \bigcirc on the handset

4. Contacts

You can store up to 200 records in your contacts. Each record can store up to 3 numbers, a name up to 25 characters long and a number up to 24 digits.

4.1 Store a name and number

If your phone is connected to a switchboard, you may need to enter a pause in a stored number. This gives the switchboard time to find an outside line. A pause is normally stored after the switchboard access code (e.g. 9). When storing a number, press and hold (#) until the display shows **P**. You can then continue entering the phone number.

If you have subscribed to Caller ID Service and wish to display the name of your caller instead of the number, save the full telephone number including the area code to your contacts.

You can store multiple entries with the same name. However, to prevent unnecessary duplicated entries, you can only store the same number once.

- 1. Press (A) in standby mode to access the contact list.
- 2. Press the left ⊕, scroll ∨ to Add contact.
- 3. Press the left \bigcirc , enter the name and press \vee .
- 4. Enter the home number and press \vee .
- 5. Enter the mobile number and press v.
- 6. Enter the work number and press ∨.
- 7. Press the left or right navigation key to select a ringtone.
- 8. Press the left to save.

Note

You must enter at least the name and one number in order to save the contact.

Entering names

Use the keypad letters to enter names, e.g. to store **Tom**:

Press (2) once to enter T.

Press (£) three times to enter o.

Press 🗐 once to enter **m**.

Writing tips

Press the right \bigcirc to delete the last character or digit.

Press \land or \lor to move between characters or digits.

Press o to insert a space.

Press $\mbox{\#}$ to switch between the uppercase, lowercase letters and numbers.

4.2 View or dial an entry

- Press ② in standby mode to access the contact list.
 Scroll △ or ✓ to select a contact.
 OR
 Enter the first letter of the name to search alphabetically.
 The first name that starts with this letter or the nearest letter in the alphabet will be displayed. Scroll △ or ✓ to the entry you want.
 Press ③ to view the information or ③ to dial the number.
 Edit a name and number
 Press ③ in standby mode to access the contact list.
 Scroll △ or ✓ to the entry you want to edit, or search alphabetically.
 - 3. Press the left , select **Edit contact**.
 - 4. Press the left ⊕, edit the name and press ∨.
 - 5. Edit the home number and press v.
 - 6. Edit the mobile number and press ∨.
 - 7. Edit the work number and press v.
 - 8. Press the < or > to select a ringtone.
 - 9. Press the left (-) to save.

4.4 Delete a selected entry

- 1. Press (R) in standby mode to access the contact list.
- 2. Scroll ^ or ∨ to the entry you want to edit, or search alphabetically.
- 3. Press the left ⊕. Scroll ∨ to **Delete**.
- Press the left
 Select Delete Selected. If you want to deselect all contacts, select Clear selection. Then press the left
 .
- 6. Press the left \bigcirc to again or \circledcirc to confirm confirm or the right \bigcirc to cancel.

4.5 Delete all entries

If the call is a private call, Private will be displayed.

If the number is unavailable, Unavailable will be displayed.

If the call is from an international number, the number and **International** will be displayed.

If the call is from the operator, Operator will be displayed.

If the call is from a payphone, Payphone will be displayed.

If the call is from a ringback request, Ringback will be displayed.

7.2 Calls list

The Calls list stores details of your last 50 incoming calls and 30 outgoing calls, including the phone number and date and time of the call. The Calls list also alerts you when you have unanswered calls.

The caller's details are stored in the Calls list whether or not you have answered the call. The list is shared by all handsets registered to the base. When the list is full, and a new call is received, the oldest entry will be deleted automatically.

When you have missed call(s) (incoming calls that you haven't answered), $\mbox{\ensuremath{\mbox{\&}}}$ is displayed on all handsets registered to the base. Press the left $\mbox{\ensuremath{\mbox{\bigcirc}}}$ to see the callers details.

For this feature to work, you must first subscribe to the service from your network provider. A subscription fee may be payable.

- Press the left ⊕, scroll ∨ to select Call settings.
- 3. Press the left —, scroll ≺ or ➤ to set the auto answer **On** or **Off**.
